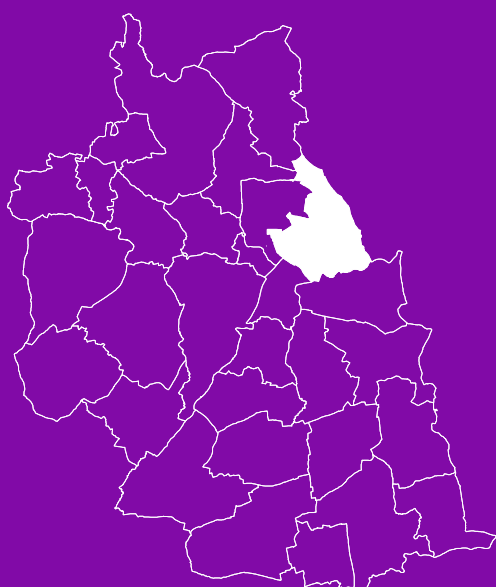

## Register of buildings of local interest

### Boreham



#### Chantry Lane, Chantry Farm

Farmhouse, mid-nineteenth century. Slate roof, half-timbered bay windows and porch on the south elevation. Group of traditional farm buildings to the south. Nineteenth century or earlier. 6 blocks with black weatherboard cladding and plain or pan tiles roofs.

#### Significance

Architectural and historic interest. Group value.



#### Church Road, Boreham Spout\*

The Boreham Spout is fed from a natural spring, which has been piped. It was the areas main water source for many centuries, until mains water was provided in the village in 1937.

#### Significance

Historic interest.



#### Church Road, The Queens Head\*

Pub. Timber framed and plastered, with plain tile roofs. Seventeenth century or earlier origins.

## Register of buildings of local interest Boreham



### Cranham Road, War Memorial

War memorial dedicated to the memory of men of the 394th Bomber Group, 9th USAAF and associated units who were based, and gave their lives in service, at Boreham Airfield during World War II. Memorial erected 1948 and rededicated 2010. Stone column on plinth.

#### Significance

Historic interest for its association with RAF Boreham and those it commemorates.



### Cranham Road, Russell Green Cottages

Cottages, mid-nineteenth century. Steep gabled roofs clad in slate. Red brick and weatherboarded walls.

#### Significance

Picturesque rural cottages of architectural interest.



### Culverts Lane, Belstead Cottage

Cottage, nineteenth century or earlier origins. Plain tile roofs, roughcast rendered walls and black weatherboarded walls.

#### Significance

Architectural interest.

## Damases Lane, Ewer Farm

Cottage, early nineteenth century, red brick with arch headed windows on the south principal elevation. Plain tile clad roofs.

Architectural interest.



## Generals Lane, Brickhouse Farm

Farmhouse, eighteenth century or earlier. Timber framed and plastered. Gabled windows to the north and south ends. Plain tiles roofs with dormers.

## Significance

Architectural interest.



## Generals Lane, Mount Maskell Cottage

Cottage, timber framed, early nineteenth century or earlier. Plastered walls, plain tile clad roof with dormer.

## Significance

Architectural interest and group value with Mount Maskell and adjacent barn.



## Main Road, The Limes

House. Early nineteenth century. Gault brick with sash windows and central portico. Hipped plain tiles roof, gabled wind to east side.

Architectural interest.

## Register of buildings of local interest Boreham



### Main Road, The Maltings House\*

House. Early nineteenth century or earlier. Timber framed and plastered. Plain tile roof with catslide to the eastern side.

#### Significance

Architectural interest and group value.



### Main Road, Hogwells

Farmhouse. Mid-nineteenth century or earlier. Gabled slate roof with rendered walls, with parapet to front and gable ends. Bay windows and porch to front elevation.

#### Significance

Architectural interest.



### Walaces Lane, Walaces Farm Cottage

Cottage, early nineteenth century. Slate covered gabled roof with dormers. Hipped roof porch. Plastered walls.

#### Significance

A rare example of a humble rural cottage.



### Waltham Road, The Thatched Cottage

Cottage. Nineteenth century or earlier. Thatched roof with half hip to south end, two eyebrow dormers to front elevation. Plastered walls.

#### Significance

Architectural interest.

## Register of buildings of local interest Boreham



### Waltham Road, Stocks Farm

Farmhouse and barn, Mid-nineteenth century farmhouse with hipped slate roofs. Sash windows. Barn to the east with double mid-streys.

#### Significance

Good example of a small rural farmstead.



### Waltham Road, Stock Farm Cottages

Cottages, early nineteenth century. Timber framed and plastered, central chimney stack, plain tile roof. Casement windows.

#### Significance

Good example of modest farmworkers cottage, group value with Stocks Farm.
