
# Cubs Collector Activity Badge at Chelmsford Museum


#### **Museum Curator Challenge**


A curator is someone who looks after the objects in a museum. They make sure they are stored safely and decide which objects to put on display.

## **Collection challenge**

Choose something you would like to collect and over 3 months build up your own collection. It can be anything that interests you – fossils, posters, cups, badges.....

You are the curator of your collection and have some important jobs to do.

## 1. Storing your collection and keeping it safe

In the museum small objects that are not on display are wrapped up in special tissue paper and kept in boxes in a locked storeroom. Some things like paintings and fabrics need to be kept in the dark so the colours don't fade in the daylight.

What will you store your collection in?



# 2. Making records with information about your collection

When curators add a new object to their collection, they carefully write down information about the object and where it is stored so they find it easily.

Make labels for objects in your collections. There is a sheet of blank labels on the next page.

Object: Ammonite fossil

Ammonites are sea creatures. They lived in the sea millions of years ago at the same time as the dinosaurs. They are extinct now.
