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Purpose

To report the receipt of representations made on part of The Essex County Council (Chelmsford City) (Prohibition of Waiting, Loading and Stopping) and (On-Street Parking Places) (Civil Enforcement Area) (Amendment No.29) Order 202*

Options

The Joint Committee has the following options available:

- 1. to agree that the proposed Order be made as advertised.
- 2. to agree that the proposed Order be made subject to modifications which result in less restrictive provisions or reduced scope; or
- 3. to agree that the proposed Order should not be made.

Recommendation(s)

- 1. The Order be made as advertised.
- 2. The people making representations be advised accordingly.

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Policies and Strategies

The report takes into account the South Essex Parking Partnership Document setting out how the SEPP will deal with requests for parking restrictions requiring TROs.

1. Background

The purpose of this proposed Order is to amend The Essex County Council (Chelmsford City) (Prohibition of Waiting, Loading and Stopping) and (On-Street Parking Places) (Civil Enforcement Area) Consolidation Order 2019 as set out below:

- 1.1 On 23 August 2021, the SEPP received a completed application form from a local resident requesting a Permit Parking Area Monday to Friday 8-10am and 2-4pm on Clarence Close. The request was to prevent inconsiderate and obstructive parking from non-residents particularly during school drop off/pick up times. The application was supported by Cllr Neil Gulliver and included a petition of 15 signatures from residents of Clarence Close.
- 1.2 Following receipt of the application the SEPP carried out a number of site visits at various times of the day/week. During the site visits conducted, between 4 and 7 vehicles were observed parking in Clarence Close, some of which were commercial vans due to works being carried out at one of the properties. No vehicles were observed parking across dropped kerbs. On all the site visits conducted vehicles were observed parking on the junction with Henniker Gate within 10 metres. Parked vehicles on the junctions hindered visibility when exiting Clarence Close onto Henniker Gate.
- 1.3 The SEPP will avoid introducing parking restrictions to combat short term invasion parking i.e. parking for the purpose of dropping off and picking up passengers or goods at a known organisation such as a school or convenience store and will only be for short periods of time. The enforcement of any restriction that is introduced to tackle a short-term parking issue requires a concentrated enforcement presence and is therefore not practical or cost effective. Both Barnes Farms Infants and Barnes Farms Junior School are part of a SEPP parking initiative, 3PR. The 3PR School Parking Initiative aims to prevent inconsiderate, illegal and dangerous parking around schools by changing attitudes and behaviours towards parking. The 3PR scheme has been launched at many schools in the six areas that the SEPP covers and has received very positive feedback and has proven to be effective.
- 1.4 However, to prevent obstructive parking on the junction of Clarence Close and Henniker Gate it has been agreed with the SEPP Joint Committee Member and Lead Officer for Chelmsford to cost a scheme to propose that 10 metres of 'No Waiting at Any Time' restrictions be introduced on the junction; in line with rule 243 of the Highway Code. The cost of the scheme is estimated at £2,000 but will be reduced if incorporated with other roads in Chelmsford to publish one Traffic Regulation Order.
- 1.5 The request was placed before the South Essex Parking Partnership Joint Committee on 13th December 2021 for funding. It was agreed at the meeting to proceed with the necessary Traffic Regulation Order.
- The Order was originally published in the Essex Chronicle and on site on 18th August 2022, and copies of the Draft Order were sent to a number of organisations including Essex Police, Essex County Council (the highway authority), Essex Fire & Rescue Service, Essex Ambulance Service, the Road Haulage Association, the Freight Transport Association, and the Chamber of Commerce and Industry.
- 1.7 When the Order was published on 18th August 2022 a 21-day period of formal public consultation commenced.

2 Comments

2.1 The details of the representations are summarised in Appendix 2 to this report together with the comments of the Technicians.

3 Conclusion

3.1 Although the correspondents have made a number of points which lead them to believe the Order should not be pursued in whole or part, the SEPP Joint Committee Member, Lead Officer and Technicians consider that none of them are of sufficient weight to warrant the Order not being made.



Dear TRO Technician,

Thank you for your prompt response with regard to this matter. I would just like to take this opportunity to expand on certain points covered in my previous email.

- 1) We applied for residents parking initially in order to try to improve the situation in Clarence Close.
- 2) We expected that the Council/SEPP would have a duty of care to try to make the situation better for the residents and not worse. If we had known that this proposal in its present form was going to be put forward we would never have applied for residents parking in the first place.
- 3) When the provision of double yellow lines at the junction of Clarence Close and Henniker Gate was put forward it was felt that this could improve matters, however, we did not expect that the lines would extend in front of our homes. No mention was ever made of this.
- 4) I believe that your proposal is salvageable if the double yellow lines are foreshortened to enable the residents of No's Clarence Close to park in front of their own homes when required. This would still keep the corners of Clarence Close clear of parked cars and keep sight lines clear for other cars and road users.
